MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

Who Are Those People?

Mary and Joseph, innkeepers, and shepherds. Heavenly hosts of angels. Ancient characters in the story of our faith; a story told in wild, imaginative, mystical metaphors meant to convey the truth of all time – God is, and God is here. Stories told to communicate to us in a way we can comprehend that God is in our history, is in our present, and will be in our future. God is guiding, cajoling, sometimes despairing, luring us with love towards the lived reality of God's hope for all eternity.

"Who are those people, and why are they there?" They are characters in our Christmas story: characters now so romanticized as to make them almost irrelevant. Characters in a story that is so incredible that it is easier to dismiss them as actors in a fairy tale than to take them seriously regarding what they might mean for us now. These are characters in a story heralding the coming of a deep peace and joy that we thought was beyond our reach. And, they are characters signalling an equal potential for great tumult, for a time of our world being turned upside down, just as theirs was all those years ago. The literalism of the story is not what should perturb or disturb us.

What should make us sit up and take notice, what should make us squirm a little, is not the imagined sexual history between Mary and Joseph and God, but the implications of what each of these characters have for our lives. Whether or not Joseph even existed is less interesting to me than whether I would be able to receive so graciously, as he did, such an incredible tale of God's good news and accompany a friend into that transformation.

It's one thing for the innkeeper to squeeze one more non-paying customer into his barn – it's another thing for me to consider the disruption of including strangers, scruffy ones at that, at our Christmas table. And the angels. These were not the cherubic children of the grade one pageants. A heavenly host in Biblical times was a militarized force. The characters who fill our Christmas stories, indeed most of the stories of our faith, are edgy and challenging, dispelling any notion of cozy comfort. Read with eyes wide open we see the grittiness of their lives, the profundity of their experiences of God. We are reminded that they were as ordinary as you and I, perhaps more challenged in their lives than we can imagine, and yet, and still, they were the people through whom God was able to work.

Perhaps the truth is that God did not chose only them, but that they were the only ones willing to respond to God's invitation. Who are those people? They are ordinary people. People challenged by housing shortages, people challenged by unexpected pregnancies, people grieving tragic changes in their life plans, people challenged by too many demands at work and not enough room in their calendars and their lives for any new joy. They are people in jobs that are less than fulfilling. They are seniors, frustrated at counting on others for rides, feeling shut off and left out. They are like most other people, and with enough openness to allow God's promises to be fulfilled through them.

And why are they there? They are on roof tops and in front yards, on communion tables and on fireplace mantles because in spite of weariness and cynicism, the weary world yearns to know that God's goodness comes still. They are there to remind us that God's goodness comes and clamours for us to risk hope, to risk generosity of spirit and action, to serve as saviours on God's behalf, redeeming our environment and the inequities in our world, and making phone calls to shut ins, and cookies for the homeless, and while we're at it receiving a joy and a peace,

a hope and a love that are beyond our imagination. Who are they? They are you and I. And Immanuel – God with us.

Comments, The Virgin Birth. Ginny Coleman

Aside from my theological education, most of my education was science-based. For years, I struggled with the notion of the "virgin" birth, knowing that it was physiologically impossible in human beings.

Did you know that the birth story appears in only 2 of the 4 Gospels (Matthew and Luke) and that the first of the Gospels, Mark, was written some 50+ years after the death of Jesus? It does not include the birth story. None of the Gospel writers ever met Jesus. In fact, none of the writers of the Scriptures ever met Jesus. It was also relatively common in those days to attach a virgin birth story to prominent figures of the day. And so, I struggled.

Then I realized that the most critical part of the story of Jesus' arrival was not whether his conception was virginal but that he came into the world. Whether he came via sperm and egg or via the visit of the angel upon Mary, no longer is of great significance for me. Jesus came, lived, and died in our human world and those are historical facts. How he lived his life and what that life taught us about how to live our lives with integrity, compassion, love, justice, and faith is what is important.

And so, I stopped struggling. Could his birth have been brought about by immaculate conception? Perhaps. Who am I, or any human, to understand the mystery that is God? Could his birth have been brought about by sperm and egg? Perhaps. Again, who am I, or any human, to understand the mystery that is God-given life?

I no longer struggle, and I can now enjoy the whole of the Christmas story, celebrating the arrival of the baby Jesus, and all that followed.

 - Agreed to have our sound system assessed.
 - Voted and approved the Category 3 Remit (see Regional Representative Report)
 - Support the need to review keyholders and alarm codes.

Regional Representative Report

This church year every congregation, governing body, and region of the United church of Canada has been expected to vote on Remit 1, <u>Establishing an Autonomous National Indigenous Organization</u>.

Approving Remit 1 will enable indigenous congregations, within the United Church of Canada, to define their own structure and processes. It acknowledges Indigenous Peoples' rights to their own spiritual identities and to self-determination. This has the potential to create a new kind of relationship. In the words of the National Indigenous Council, the United Church of Canada will be moving "from Mission to Indians... towards being partners in God's call to all the earth".

Grey Street United Church Leadership Team discussed this and voted, unanimously, to support Remit 1 at our November 15, 2023, meeting. We have sent our vote results to the authorities and expect that Remit 1 will become part of the permanent structure of the United Church of Canada.

Ministry Profile Team

After taking a break and not meeting in the summer, the Ministry Profile Team is up and working hard!

We discovered that Patrick Woodbeck (of the Big Red Church/Gordon King Memorial) is now our oversight minister. Because we hired Ginny, she is not able to do our oversight.

And, because the Ministry Profile Team also acted as a Search Team for the hire of Ginny, it is our responsibility to put together the Covenanting Service for Ginny. We have been working hard to make the service reflective of our journey and hope you will come and be present on this very meaningful day.

The team has reviewed the results of the survey done at our Annual General Meeting. A few of the important information items that the team collected are being used as a guide for collaboration talks.

These items are as follows:

- The majority of Grey Street people would like to continue to worship in our building.
- Music is an important part of our services.
- Having a minister is important, but not necessary to lead worship every Sunday.
- Flexibility in the type of worship service offered ranked high.
- Technology can play a part in our worship services.

The team accepted an invitation from Immanuel United for a meeting on October 12 to continue conversations with their Looking Ahead Group. Representatives from Big Red Church, John Black, Birds Hill, Immanuel, and Grey Street were in attendance. Each Community of Faith (CoF) gave a presentation about where they were at on their collaboration journey, answering three advance questions that were sent to us prior to the meeting. Options of different forms of collaboration were presented and then each CoF discussed which option might work best for them. Findings were reported to the larger group and the meeting ended with the recommendation that individual CoFs begin a conversation with another CoF they felt might a candidate for collaboration.

Our team also had requests from two other CoFs asking to consider them for collaboration partners. After discussion, it was decided not to pursue conversation with these two CoFs as the team felt they were not a good fit for Grey Street.

Grey Street has extended an invitation to three of our north-east Winnipeg churches to meet individually for a get-to-know you session. We received responses from all three CoFs and are currently making arrangements to meet and are developing questions that would help us determine which of these congregations might make good collaboration partners with us. We will hold an informal information session with our congregation, once the meetings with the groups have been completed, to share, in greater detail, where we are on our collaboration journey.

Outside Church User Groups Report

The number of outside user groups using our facility has remained unchanged over the past year. We are happy to be able to continue to share our venue with the following groups:

East Winnipeg Unida Christian Church

This is the 4^{th} year that we are pleased to share our facility with East Winnipeg Unida Christian Church. They meet every Sunday for worship throughout the year (summer included) from 2:00 pm - 7:00 pm. They also have weekly music rehearsals, and regular Bible Study and Youth Group meetings.

The Doughnators

The Doughnators are a nonprofit group of volunteers who make and sell perogies to help provide funding for shelter to animals in need. They are a large group that use our kitchen facility twice a month (every second weekend). They also do community outreach by providing meals for folks in need at special times of the year (Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter). Grey Street United Church has been pleased to partner with The Doughnators with their community outreach projects.

Kookums Pantry

Kookums Pantry uses our kitchen facility several times a week preparing Bannock and other tasty goods to sell at local markets.

Sonolux Choir

Sonolux Choir is a group of volunteers who perform at various venues throughout the city. They rehearse in our sanctuary every Monday from 6:30 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Keep your eyes open for Sonolux concerts offered during the year.

Embers and Girl Guides

The Embers and Girl Guides are long time users of our facility. The Embers meet on Mondays from 6:30 pm – 8:30 pm and the Guides meet Tuesdays from 6:30 p.m. – 8:30 p.m.

A few 'maintenance' issues occurred this fall and they have all been resolved thanks to Stacy's dedication and excellent work (i.e., making the calls and coordinating workers to do the repairs when she is in the building).

These maintenance issues were:

- (i) our large cooler started to leak water inside the unit.
- (ii) one of our ovens stopped working.
- (iii) our grand piano required tuning.

We are thankful to all our outside user groups for choosing Grey Street United Church as their service venue and for giving 'life' to our building beyond the needs of our congregation.

Refugee Interest Group Report (RIG)

On July 6, 2023, Fahima Fazely celebrated one year in Winnipeg! She has accomplished so much in this time. Here are a few highlights:

- Fahima's name was put forward by the McLeod Adult Education Centre as one of eight Manitobans nominated for the 2023 Council of the Federation Literacy award.
- Fahima is very appreciative of the support and encouragement she is receiving from her teachers, classmates, and friends. She wants to complete her grade 12 and is continuing with her schooling, that includes English and computer classes.
- She has passed the written portion of a beginner's drivers test, taken First Aid / CPR course and a Food Handler's certification course.

Employment has been a serious concern to Fahima. It is difficult to find employment in Canada, without any experience in this country. But fortunately, she has landed, not only one, but two part-time jobs! Her first job is as a custodian at Immanuel United Church. Fahima's was extremely excited and announced, "my first job in Canada is in a holy place." Within two weeks, she was offered another position in the Food and Nutrition Department at Concordia Village (in the kitchen). Both places of employment are flexible enough that she can continue her schooling. She is so grateful for these opportunities.

I had taken Fahima to a dental appointment this spring and discovered she was missing most of her back teeth. I called up, Grey Street's own denturist, Jamie Swiskoski to see if she could help. Jamie generously made the partial that Fahima needed. Thank you, Jamie! The Bahaduri family feels very supported by their family and friends they have made with the RIG group.

I was also fortunate enough to be invited to the fifth birthday of Smah on April 30, 2023. Smah, her sister Snah (age three), welcomed a baby brother on September 5th. The healthy baby is named ELHAM, meaning 'good news'. Mom, Mawji and dad, Shafiq felt the name reflected their feeling about their new life in Canada. Snah was not sure if she wanted a baby but is now quite happy to show him off.

Living in the IRCOM apartment complex offers support for childcare while Shafiq and Mawji take English classes and Smah started kindergarten at Dufferin School this fall. The family went on a number of outing this summer to the beaches and continues to thrive.

The Loaves and Fishes interest group has decided to make our newcomer families recipients, as part of the Month of Giving this year. We will make hampers containing staple foods (and maybe a few treats) for the families. Thank you for your continued prayers and support.

- Canned soup, particularly lentil, pea, or vegetable soups.
